

Understanding Cousinhood Charts

John Valdez, Ed.D. opened 2019 with the presentation titled "How To Read A Cousinhood Chart" by Deborah J. Ramsay. John explained to the membership that there are a wide array of charts out there many of which are difficult to process. The chart created by Deborah J. Ramsay is in his opinion one of the easier ones to process. John also showed the membership several charts in which he shows his familial connection to several members including Tom J. Martinez, Richard Arellano, Bob Craig. He also showed charts

in which Charlene Garcia Simms is related to Kathy Pacheco and Ken Gardner. In addition, John showed charts in which Kathy Pacheco is related to Betty Duran, Marty Gomez Hill and Ed (Edumenio) Aguilar. He would like to show how other members are related to one another, so his hope is to show new charts at monthly meetings. Those of you that know John, know that he is very passionate and knowledgeable about genealogy. He was born in Costilla, NM

and his family moved to Avondale, CO when he was two years old. He comes from a family with seven children. He is married to Nancy and has one son named Chris. During John's career of 36 years in education, he has been a Spanish teacher, a school counselor and a secondary school administrator. He got the genealogy bug from his maternal grandmother from Costilla. She also had moved to Pueblo and John lived with her while attending college. John says that in his genealogical research, he has had many "aha" moments. Most recently, he found that his maternal 2x great grandparents were married in San Juan de los Caballeros, NM in 1855. The interesting piece is that the entry shows that the groom, Manuel Montemayor was from Pueblo Higueras, Nuevo Leon, MX. So, John is still fascinated with what was he doing in NM; Monterrey, Nuevo Leon is almost 900 miles from Santa Fe, NM. He joined FACC in 2007 and we are happy to have him.

Using DNA to Find Your Cousins

In February the presentation was covered by Tom, Martinez who showed us "How To Use DNA Results To Find Other Cousins". **This presentation as well as John's have given rise to additional meetings** in which members have been taught how to use GedMatch and other internet resources to find more cousins. By finding more cousins, it is the belief of Tom and John that one may find relatives who may have done extensive genealogical research. That through this relationship and communication, members might find a way to breakdown "brickwalls." Tom would like us to remember that before you actually take a DNA test research should be done on different tests to make an educated choice. Also, if you really want to know about cousins you should

upload your DNA results to GEDMATCH. This allows you to use more tools in your search for cousins. He adds that most companies give you ethnicities estibut it changes from company to company and as the sample population gets larger. Tom was born in San Francisco, CO in the San Luis Valley. His family moved to Pueblo when he was about nine years old. He enrolled at Bradford Elem. and graduated from East HS. He has fond memories of playing in a band which played lots of Mexican music. Tom married Gloria, another strong member of FACC, and they had two children. They started out with the idea of making it

We are blessed that he found us.

Genealogy Software For Your Computer

Phyllis Miranda, one of our FACC members, gave a presentation on three software programs: Legacy Family Tree 9, Roots Magic 7, and Family Tree Maker 2017. BUT FIRST, let me tell you a little about Phyllis. She was born in Colorado Springs to a military man so her family moved around quite a bit. At three months, her family moved to Germany and they lived there for three years. From Germany they moved to Louisiana, then to San Antonio, and back to

Colorado Springs when she was in fourth grade. After graduating from Harrison High School she joined the Air Force. Legacy Family Tree 9: Has free version/ deluxe version \$35/ nice user interface/ user friendly/ software is easy but source template is not easy to use/ does color coding/extensive set of charts not just pedigree with lists and tables

Roots Magic 7: free basic version/ deluxe version \$30/ source templates are very user friendly/ can use more than one database/ interface-program is not as user friendly as Legacy/ not that good for beginners/ free phone app

Family Tree Maker 2017: Provides color coding/ so many charts, tables/ no

All three versions sync with Ancestry and Family Search. All do photos, images, and documents. **Phyllis stresses that everyone should use a computer software program instead of an online tree building services.** Reasons are you can limit access to your data. It cheaper than paying fees. You own it.
